Ronald "Gipsy" Smith, a British evangelist who conducted campaigns in the United States and Great Britain for over 70 years around the turn of the 20th century, said of this song, "Men sing it, boys whistle it and women rock their babies to sleep to it." The song is "Count Your Blessings." It was written by Johnson Oatman Jr., just one of the more than 5000 religious songs he wrote during his life. Of all the songs Oatman wrote, he claimed two as his favorites: "No, Not One" and "Higher Ground." DID YOU KNOW?

August 1 is National Homemade Pie Day! It's a day to celebrate pie, a dish that has existed since the era of the ancient Egyptians. The ancient Egyptians are the earliest-known civilization to have had a pie dish. It typically consisted of a crust made from wheat, oats, rye, or barley and filled with honey.

In Great Britain, pies were often referred to as 'coffyns.' They were mainly used as a covering to

preserve meat, especially on long sea voyages as fresh meat could not be obtained. During medieval times, these pies became more elaborate as cooks tried to outdo each other in presentation. At grand banquets, pies were often the centerpiece of the food table as the pie cases were removed to reveal the delicious fillings underneath. Sometimes, live actors or musicians were hidden inside pies to burst out as a surprise.

Until the 15th century, pies usually only contained meat or fish, but they soon included fruits and custard. It is reported that the very first cherry pie was baked for Queen Elizabeth I during the 16th century. As English settlers arrived in America, pies came along with them. Early versions often had thick, heavy crusts of rough flour and suet. Pies soon became a trademark American dish and today are heavily associated with traditional American life. When soldiers were asked why they were going off to war during World War II, they replied, "For mom and apple pie."

August celebrates a variety of pie days from National Raspberry Cream Pie Day on August 1 to National Braham Pie Day on August 4. Braham Pie Day is celebrated on the first Friday of August every year.

The town of Braham was named the 'Homemade Pie Capital of Minnesota' by Governor Rudy Perpich in 1990. The town gathered fame for its pie in the 1930s and 1940s when tourists and locals would drive to their lake homes while taking the "shortcut to Duluth through Braham." The long drives would often tempt the hungry and tired travelers to make a stop at the Park Cafe for pie and coffee. In fact, Park Cafe became so popular that travelers eagerly waited to exit the Twin Cities to finally have a taste of Braham's muchloved pies.

The celebrations for Braham Pie Day began in July 1990. It started as a pie and ice cream social event and was funded by a Celebrate Minnesota tourism grant. In 1992, it was decided that the celebration should have a fixed day and from July the day was moved to the first Friday in August. The event has grown to include competitions, parades, and other exhibitions. Today it is not uncommon to find crafters, small quilt displays, recycled pie tin art contests, antique bicycles, and car shows as a part of the Braham Pie Day celebrations. You can find up to 1,100 homemade and artisan pies in the town of Braham.

Don't forget National Lemon Meringue Pie on August 15, National Ice Cream Pie Day on August 18, National Chocolate Pecan Pie Day on August 20, or National Peach Pie Day on August 24. Celebrate August with a slice of some delicious homemade pie!


