IN THE GARDEN

Sometimes you have to wait till the ending to understand what you have seen or read. This is true with mystery books that wait until the final pages to reveal "who done it". It is equally true with certain films, where the way they end makes watching the entire film worthwhile. That is certainly the way I remember the 1984 film, "Places in the Heart". This film had excellent performances by actors such as Sally Field, Ed Harris, John Malkovich, and Danny Glover. The narrative followed Edna Spalding, a young woman who was forced to take over the running of her farm during the Great Depression, after the death of her husband.

The film contains themes of death, racism, gender inequalities, and prejudice against the backdrop of rural life and the poverty and despair of the Great Depression. It is not easy to watch. But it is the ending that has stayed with me. The final scene of the movie takes place in a church, during communion. As the communion trays are passed, the camera shows townspeople in the pews who were seen throughout the film, the living and the dead, those who were murdered, those who were forced to flee for their lives, those who hated, those who killed. Each in turn, passing communion, quietly saying to each other the blessing, "Peace of God", all while the choir sings, "In the Garden".

This supernatural and spiritual ending fits in well with the history of the hymn, "In the Garden". It was a vision that led Austin Miles to write the words to this song. On a day in March 1912, Miles let his Bible fall open to John 20:1-18, which describes the meeting of the resurrected Jesus and Mary. As Miles read the verses, he seemed to be drawn into that meeting. In his words, "My hands were resting in the Bible while I stared at the light blue wall. As the light faded, I seemed to be standing at the entrance of a garden, looking down a gently winding path, shaded by olive branches. I witnessed the arrival of Mary, Peter, and John as they gathered at the tomb... I witnessed the appearance of Jesus. I awakened in full light, gripping the Bible, with muscles tense and nerves vibrating. Under the inspiration of this vision, I wrote as quickly as the words could be formed the poem exactly as it has appeared."

The final line of this poem-turned-hymn sums up the joy Miles felt as being in the garden with Christ: "And the joy we share as we tarry there, none other has ever known."

On Sunday, October 22, we dedicated the newly established Sanctuary Garden. It is the result of a vision that we have a place on our church grounds where the words of poet Doxis Palmer may be realized:

You who walk,
Maybe with troubled thoughts,
Come, enter here and rest;
And may the sweet serenity of growing things,
And the heavenly peace
Be mirrored in the soul.

Please spend a moment in our Sanctuary Garden. Hopefully it will be a place where hatred, racism, and prejudice is forgotten, replaced by a time of sweet communion with the Lord.

Caregiver NATIONAL CAREGIVERS MONTH

November is National Family Caregivers Month in the United States. It's observed to call attention to the hard work of more than 50 million family caregivers across the country.

Caregivers provide several different types of support. In providing personal care, caregivers assist with personal hygiene, getting in and out of beds/chairs and walking, and meal preparation and feeding. Medical care involves organizing and giving medications, managing and attending medical appointments, and arranging nursing or other support. Other life management tasks include shopping for food, clothing, and other essentials, providing transportation, managing finances, housekeeping, communications, and arranging respite care providers, to name a few.

Caregiver Action Network (the National Family Caregivers Association) began promoting national recognition of family caregivers in 1994. They spearheaded the annual national celebration of a national caregiver awareness month every November.

The 2022 National Family Caregiver Month presidential proclamation reads:


"Family caregivers are the backbone of our Nation's long-term care system, doing essential work with devotion, often at great emotional and financial cost. We owe them. It is time to bring their service out of the shadows and celebrate and support them in living their own happy, healthy, and fulfilling lives."
